From time to time the Council participates in opportunities with area industries to provide enhancements to our community. In the past this has included scholarships, staff training sponsorships, and support for community projects like the greenhouse.

Earlier this month our partnership with Suncor on the Adelaide Wind Project was announced. This is the second renewable energy project Aamjiwnaang acquired an interest in. With an ownership stake in the success of the project we have the opportunity to receive an annual revenue stream for future community enhancement and development.

The most recent opportunity is our application to the Enbridge Safe Communities Program. If we are successful in obtaining this funding it will go toward holding an Emergency Training Exercise which will become a part of the Emergency Response Plan for our community.

Our staff and Council take great care and consideration before deciding to enter into these opportunities with industry. The best interests of the community are always at the forefront of any decision and it is always made clear to the funders that the Aamjiwnaang community will continue to be advocates and champions for the environment to ensure that it is safe and protected for all to enjoy.

JOB TITLE: Director of Operations

BASIC FUNCTION: The Director of Operations provides management leadership to all the programs/services within the Territory. The Director of Operations ensures that all programs and services are developed, enhanced and managed in an effective and efficient manner that provides for a better quality of life for all members of the First Nation. A key responsibility is to provide the supporting link between Chief and Council, committees and the programs/services.

MAJOR RESPONSIBILITIES & PERFORMANCE REQUIREMENTS:

1. The Director of Operations is responsible for quality assurance for the organization. Plans and directs the professional and efficient functioning of all First Nation Programs, Services, and Operational initiatives on a global level.
2. The Director of Operations shall meet regularly with the Supervisor(s) and staff, to maintain communication and to ensure Council directives are completed in a timely manner.
3. Responsible for ensuring long and short term business, operational and administrative plans and strategies are established and are reflective of the First Nation Community and Council direction.
4. Responsible for the coordination and implementation of organizational strategic planning; goal and objective setting; short and long term operational planning.
5. Facilitates the Operations Team/Staff meetings and the Department/Program Head Team meetings to ensure an efficient and effective communications network exists amongst all components within the organization, and to ensure a collaborative effort is made in the areas of operational and financial planning, policy development and resource management.
6. To supervise program/department managers and other personnel who report directly to the Director of Operations.

7. To coordinate joint activities between programs and departments which meet the operational objectives and direction of Council.
8. Provides the link and liaison between the Operations and Council by attending all Council meetings and participates as a resource person or a member on various committees.
9. Directs and controls the day to day operations of the First Nation administration and community programs and services ensuring long and short term business arrangements and operational needs are implemented for maximum productivity and effective delivery of service.
10. Shares the responsibility with the Finance Manager to ensure management of financial resources is done in a cost effective and prudent manner.
11. Responsible for ensuring day to day activities and transactions reflect sound business principles, practices, and good business sense.
12. It is the responsibility of the Director of Operations to ensure that the communication channels and information flows are accurate and consistent throughout the organization.
13. To promote and maintain good public relations with co-workers; other First Nations and political organizations; all levels of governments; the band membership and the general public.
14. To develop an annual work plan for the year and present to Chief and Council for approval, as well as periodic updates.
15. Ensure confidentiality of client; employee; community member and Council information is maintained at all times.
16. To participate in quarterly reviews with the supervisor(s) and all staff.
17. To perform other related duties as directed by Chief and Council.

- Extended periods of concentration and attention to detail.
- Adjusting schedule to meet the changing demands in areas of responsibilities.
- On-call responsibility to respond to emergency situations.


The Aamjiwnaang Bus Transportation Policy is available upon request. To ensure the bus safety of our students, we must all work together.

What is RRAP?

- It is a CMHC program for **LOW-INCOME** homeowners
- Provides loans, a part of which may not have to be paid back
 - Available to repair substandard living units

What repairs qualify my house?

- Your house must be substandard or deficient in one or more of the following:



- Structural
- Heating
- Disabled
- Electrical
- Fire Safety
- Plumbing

- Adaptations to make a unit accessible for a disabled occupant also qualifies for the Disabled RRAP program

Who is eligible?

- The **TOTAL** household's income must be lower than \$42,000.00.
Written verification of household income is required from all residence of the home.

The Inspector is available every Monday to do RRAP inspections. Please call the Housing Department at 519-336-8410. Deadline is September 30, 2015 to submit all required paperwork and quotes.

School Registration – see attached school listing for registration dates and fees for the Lambton Kent District School Board.

- Aamjiwnaang will cover Activity and Locker Rental Fees up to \$35.00.
- Students on the Aamjiwnaang bus list for the following schools: Alexander Mackenzie, SCITS, and St. Clair High School, must identify themselves as an Aamjiwnaang student to have your Activity and Locker Rental Fees waived at registration. The school will invoice the Education Department for the fees.
- Students with Aamjiwnaang membership attending other schools will be reimbursed up to \$35; receipts must be submitted to the Education Department.

School Supplies – Secondary students with Aamjiwnaang membership are eligible to receive one Walmart Gift Certificate valued at \$45 to purchase school supplies.

- The gift certificate may be picked up at the Education Department after September 3, 2015 and up to December 15th of given year.
- Signatures are required by student and/or parent/guardian. A note is required to authorize other individuals to pick up gift certificate.
- Off-reserve students must provide proof of registration.



Environmental Health Research Update

Greetings Community Members,

I would like to provide an update on some of the activities the Health Centre has been working on in environmental health research.

1. **Sex Ratio Update**

We are working with Dr. Laurie Chan from the University of Ottawa to update our 2005 Sex Ratio study. The original study looked at births between 1984-2003 and found that a higher proportion of girls were born between 1994-2003. We are expanding the study over a longer period of time, from approximately 1970-2014. We are also working with Lambton Public Health to compare with their data. Depending on the findings and recommendations, Dr. Chan is prepared to help us with the next step, which may be trying to determine a cause if any abnormalities are found.

2. **Community Cancer Profile**

We have been working with the Aboriginal Cancer Control Unit at Cancer Care Ontario for quite some time to establish the rates of cancer in our community. We expect to have some results back within the next 6 months. The Aboriginal Cancer Control Unit is also working with the Chiefs of Ontario to establish cancer rates for all First Nations in Ontario. This means we should be able to compare our community's rates to those found in other First Nations across Ontario.

Cancer Care Ontario is also working on a research study, where they have identified cancer rates for Lambton County, including Aamjiwnaang. They have also looked at risk factors and how they influence cancer rates, such as fruit/vegetable intake, smoking and alcohol. I have reviewed their raw, unpublished data and are working with them on the release of this data, through the Lambton Community Health Study. Cancer Care Ontario plans to publish this study by summer 2016.

3. **First Nations Food, Nutrition & Environment Study**

This study was completed through the Assembly of First Nations. Our drinking water sampling demonstrated there are no concerns with the levels of heavy metals. We did not test for any other contaminants. Our traditional food sampling demonstrated that our traditional foods are safe to eat. We tested for various metals and contaminants in wild game, birds, fish and plants. The levels of contaminants found in our foods were similar to those found in traditional foods tested across Ontario. The mercury testing in hair showed that none of the 83 participants exceeded guideline levels. They also compared mercury levels to those found in a past study from 1979 and found that mercury levels have decreased. Our mercury levels were similar to those found in the general Canadian population. A community presentation was scheduled back in March, but no one attended. We are now hosting a lunch & learn on August 20 to present the results and answer questions.

If you ever have any questions, please feel free to come and see me. I will do my best to try and answer them for you.

Let's Talk

What Does It Mean When Drug Users Talk About Being Dope Sick?

When a drug user is speaking of being 'dope sick,' he or she is referring to the withdrawal symptoms from coming off of drugs. Most users consider dope sickness a product of detoxing from opiates, although others may use the term when describing withdrawal from other substances. The symptoms of withdrawal encompass emotional and physical changes that can last anywhere from a few days to over a month, depending on the user, their substance of choice and how much they were accustomed to taking.

The Physical Withdrawal Symptoms

- Tremors and shaking
- Muscle aches and spasms, including 'restless' muscles
- Hot and cold flashes
- Digestion disruptions, including loss of appetite or, conversely, a huge return of appetite
- An insatiable desire to eat
- Vomiting, diarrhea and, sometimes, constipation

Some addicts also list a surplus of unpleasant symptoms upon experiencing withdrawal from opiates. Some state they have the sensation of bugs crawling on or under the skin, which can lead to self-harm from scratching or slapping at the sensations. Others mention bizarre and unique physical sensations, such as being hyper-aware of their breathing, heartbeat or other feelings that largely pass unnoticed by those not undergoing withdrawal. Other symptoms could possibly include severe dry mouth, an insatiable urge to drink, intense headaches, sweating, uncontrollable yawning and problems with balance.

Emotional Side Effects of Opiate Withdrawal

A wide range of mental and emotional issues that recovering addicts may struggle with, including:

- Mental agitation, to the point that it is quite easy for the recovering addict to fly into a rage or to cry over small issues

- Anxiety, ranging from slight feelings of unease to paralyzing paranoia
- Frustration at tasks the person may otherwise find simple
- Overwhelming feelings of depression, dependency, loneliness or worthlessness

While the vast majority of addicts undergoing detox say that mental and emotional aspects are terrible, there are unreliable stories which claim that detox brought on a sense of euphoria or of leaving the body entirely. Almost any emotional state could be experienced during withdrawal, so it's important that the loved ones of the addict are prepared for all possibilities.

Getting Help to End Addiction

Residential inpatient treatment is among the best options for addicts hoping to break free of using. In a facility, the addict can expect to have his or her health monitored, and may have the opportunity to seek cognitive behavioral therapy. It is also healthy for addicts to have others around who understand the struggles of detox and can lend a sympathetic ear.

If you or a loved one are experiencing dope sickness and are ready to make a positive change in your life, an inpatient treatment facility can help you handle the stresses of withdrawal. Don't delay. There are a wide range of treatment options available to help those who want to get clean, so seek one out and make a huge change in your life today by calling the Health Centre.

Naloxone is that stuff that you stick through the heart, like in that movie Pulp Fiction, right?

No, while naloxone does have an injectable form, it is never injected into the heart. The injectable form of naloxone is injected intramuscularly. However, the dramatic difference between the character overdosing and the character after receiving the medicine that is depicted in the film is a possible scenario with naloxone.

Did you know?

Regional HIV/AIDS Connection in London, ON ((519) 434-1601 distributes naloxone (take home program) through their syringe access program and is easily accessible to all opioid users in our community. 

The proponent identified below is proposing to submit a proposal to the Independent Electricity System Operator (IESO) to design, build, and operate a Large Renewable Project for the generation of electricity under the IESO's Large Renewable Procurement (LRP).

The LRP is a competitive process for procuring large renewable energy projects generally larger than 500 kilowatts. 

Overview:

The Chiefs of Ontario is seeking an individual or a firm to provide advisory services to the Chiefs of Ontario on acquiring an interest in Hydro One.

Background:

First Nation communities in Ontario will require the services of an experienced and qualified advisor in order to assess our interests and relationship with Hydro One. An individual or firm will allow us an opportunity to gain better insight to the issues and requirements necessary to effectively determine our collective next steps, including acquiring an interest in Hydro One.

The Ontario First Nation communities are integral in the operations of Hydro One and as a result we will need to have a well-structured framework in place prior to the IPO that will ensure that we will be fairly compensated, including being provided the opportunity to acquire a meaningful stake in the company and to protect our interests and rights going forward.

Skills and Experience:

The individual or firm selected should be meet the following requirements:

- A knowledge of the mainstream capital markets process as well as proven capabilities in valuation, transfer and structuring of hard asset transactions such as Hydro One;
- A knowledge of Aboriginal legal issues, including but not limited to the legacy issues related to Hydro One;
- Experience negotiating on behalf of First Nations communities, with a focus on large scale acquisitions and/or ownership ventures;
- A knowledge of the initial public offering process;
- A broad knowledge about the Ontario energy sector;
- A knowledge of the creation and operation of corporate entities, including by not limited to the corporations, trusts, partnerships and;
- A knowledge of large scale financing, including First Nations financing opportunities.

Chiefs of Ontario Mandate:

The Ontario Caucus passed a motion to direct the PC to investigate a business opportunity for First Nations to become partial owners of the Hydro One assets. The concept is for the ownership to be transferred outside of the Initial Public Offering (IPO) as part of a compensation package to pay down the historic rent owed to First Nations by Hydro One.

Deliverables:

The Contractor will provide an assessment of potential frameworks for First Nations in Ontario to collectively acquire ownership in Hydro One, along with a list of considerations, requirements, and a cost/benefit analysis for each of the frameworks. A final set of deliverables will be determined jointly between Chiefs of Ontario and the Contractor.

- Detailed work plan and project schedule with relevant milestones dates identified;

ABSOLUTELY!!!!!!

July 10 is the 188th Anniversary of the signing of the Treaty 29 Treaty.

It sets out how we have what we have and the Lands we set aside for our people and our future Generations.

Our people set aside our lands and agreed to share our resources with the newcomers to the Three Fires Territory.

These are Pre Confederation Treaties that were signed before Canada was Canada signed with the British Crown. Canada just held its Canada Day Celebration for its July 1st 1867 -148th Birthday, our Treaty is older than Canada.

It is important to know your History and let Canada and Canadians know we are all Treaty people. We both have obligations to the Treaties and need to uphold our ends. Approximately 2.8 million acres of land was part of the Huron Tract called the Treaty 29.

Today the Treaty 29 area turns 188 years old. Each of the original Bands Aamjiwnaang, Bkejwanong Kettle and Stony Point were of one Nation that agreed to the Treaty signed with the British Crown allowing the area to be settled. The Treaty partners agreed to the sale but kept the select areas for their own members for their own use and enjoyment and they are still in place today.

Over next few months I will create more information on the Treaty areas for your knowledge and our Treaty partners to share.

Remember "We are all Treaty People"


