Qualifications:

- Graduation from a post-secondary in horticulture preferred.
- Working knowledge of and commitment to the rescue and propagation of native plant species on the Aamjiwnaang First Nation.
- Experience collecting information to develop databases and documentation for a catalogue system of the rescued plants, gathered seeds and green house stock
- A high degree of initiative and self-direction; good analytical, organizational and communication skills.
- Well-developed interpersonal skills; strong interest in greenhouse propagation
- High level of appreciation of First Nation issues.
- Excellent public relations skills, including an appreciation of the need for tact, discretion and a positive, cheerful and informed approach with the public.

Job Summary:

- Organize tool and safety equipment storage area
- Organize Natural Pest Management system (primarily in the greenhouse)
- Develop a list of sites and a schedule for seed collection and cuttings at a number of natural areas containing valuable native plant material that we do not expect to obtain through rescue. This sourcing will help to re-build populations of rare plants.
- Research types of containers/quantities to be used for propagation, based on available space
- Research propagation books/sites specific to native plants of this region – organize information resources for shared use
- Maintain storage and propagation areas
- Develop a documentation and cataloguing system for rescued plants, gathered seeds and greenhouse stock and assist with fall plant rescues and seed collection
- Seed cleaning, seed cataloguing and storage and monitor collected seed for moisture, vermin
- Research seed propagation techniques specific to each type of collected seed, including seed preparation – stratification, scarification
- Propagule maintenance: cutting back, removal of dead foliage, thinning
- Document propagation success rates (ongoing inventory)
- Monthly progress reports

Things worth knowing

This week (Nov 15-22) is National Aboriginal Addictions Awareness Week (NAAAW). There have been lots of activities so far and continuing in the community such as educational and supportive presentations, a Super Hero dance, Family Feud game, awards, etc.

Many people can experience positive change simply by becoming aware of an issue. National Aboriginal Addictions Awareness Week is a time to raise awareness about how addictions can impact a community. We know more today about the different types of addictions, be it alcohol, prescription and non-prescription drugs, food, gambling, sex, or others.

FYI – How does Alcohol Affect a Teenager’s Brain?

Did you know that as a teenager your brain may be more easily harmed by alcohol than the brain of an adult?

We now know that the human brain is not fully developed until we are in our twenties. As a teenager, your brain is still changing a lot, and drinking alcohol can damage its growth. If your brain cannot develop properly, you can have serious problems that last into adulthood. Recent research in the Inuit region of Nunavik shows that alcohol misuse among teens is a problem. Binge drinking (drinking a large quantity of alcohol at one time), especially among teenage girls, is a big concern. This information came from “Use of alcohol and other drugs by Nunavik youths: key results of the survey”. By C. Plourde et al., Recherche et intervention sur les substances psychoactives – Québec, 2007.

How Alcohol Affects the Developing Brain:

Alcohol can harm a part of your brain that is very important for your memory and learning. If you drink often or heavily, you may have problems remembering information and learning new things, even when you are sober. These problems can continue as an adult. Drinking beer, hard liquor, wine, rubbing alcohol or any liquid that contains alcohol can lead to changes in the brain so you have trouble concentrating, solving problems and knowing right from wrong. This can cause big problems in school, relationships and all parts of your life. The brain is what makes us feel good, feel pain, make the right decisions, etc. If alcohol is used to help you feel good, the brain will “forget” how to feel pleasure or be happy on its own. That is how powerful alcohol is – it interferes with the “happy feeling” chemicals in the brain.

What Else Can Happen When a Teenager Drinks?

Alcohol poisoning can happen when large amounts of alcohol are consumed in a short period of time. Alcohol poisoning is exactly what it sounds like – the body has become poisoned by the alcohol. Violent vomiting is usually the first symptom of alcohol poisoning. Extreme sleepiness, unconsciousness (blacking out), difficulty breathing, dangerously low blood sugar, seizures, and even death may result. If you begin drinking at a young age, you may have a much greater risk of becoming dependent on alcohol (addicted, an alcoholic). For example, one survey found that almost half of the people who began drinking before the age of 14 became dependent (addicted) at some point in their lives. Only nine per cent of people (or one out of 10) who began drinking at age 21 or later became addicted. This information was adapted from “Teen Drinking Leads to High Risk of Adult Alcoholism.” By R. Thatcher, in Circle Talk, Vol. 2, No. 3, 2006, p. 18-19.



MAKING THE 94 RECONCILIATION RECOMMENDATIONS REAL.

Recently we were honoured to have TRC Commissioner Marie Wilson address a packed crowd at our Community Centre.

She first explained how she appreciated having family relationships and extended family.. Her husband a Dene and a survivor had to learn this from her. It is an extraordinary thing we as survivors were deprived of this.

It is important for all of us to understand the importance of the legacy of residential schools, the legacy of trauma and violence that individuals as well as family members have undergone. Through multi-generations these schools have negatively affected the home to this day.

The role of the TRC was three fold: 1) reveal the many hidden unspoken truths about residential schools; 2) identify the impacts of residential schools; 3) encourage and inspire individuals and collectively to learn about Reconciliation.

Ms. Wilson shared this story...a child age 3 was forced to wear a wrist band which said "pagan", this child became so ashamed of her family for practicing traditional rights, she would eat many communion wafers to get the pagan out of her. Another story is of a man who couldn't love his own child, what ever happened to him at that school, what did they do to him. You don't know that you could have had a better life because you don't know how. When you find out your parent went to residential school, find forgiveness, stop blaming him or her.

It was a massive task to undertake to get archives from government and churches. There were no archives from the children so statement gathering was undertaken from these broken spirits. This was a sacred trust. So the seven sacred teachings were used at the seven National gatherings...Winnipeg-Respect; Nunavit- Trust; Halifax- Love; Saskatoon-Truth; Montreal-Humility; Vancouver-Honesty; Edmonton-Wisdom.

The lesson learned - when one nation thinks it knows better what is best for others and their children, we create deep and lasting problems. Language was used as a weapon. We have a national crisis with the epidemic suicidal rate related to Res-

idential Schools and the untreated trauma. If nothing is done, this is a betrayal.

What the Commissioners have learned is this... Canada is listening and want to do something to change, to care, desire to set things right. Society and all its levels of government and organizations have a huge role to play to redress the problem when the government made the schools mandatory.

The human capacity for resiliency is nothing short of miraculous. Forgiveness is almost beyond belief and beyond deserving. There is emerging hope that things can get better.

Reconciliation will take time to address the disrepair and disconnection and to rebuild. Reconciliation belongs to all of us not just the survivors. Vigilance is needed so society doesn't slide backwards.

The TRC have given us a road map with the 94 recommendations. We must decide where we each and collectively can make changes happen through school boards, faith connections, organizations and government agencies. We need to make these 94 recommendations real, we can do something big or small. We are not two solitudes, Indigenous and Non-Indigenous. How are we not aware of each other? We cannot be strangers to each other any longer.

Canada has a chance to breathe new life into treaties and agreements as we are all Treaty People. A true spirit of understanding is required.

Residential School History, Treaties and Indigenous Truth must be taught in order to pass high school.

Communities, spiritual and political leadership need to have informed opinion. Gear up for the long haul. This will be rich and enriching for all of us but this will not happen overnight, be patient.

Recommendation 53 is important in that it requires accountability that the other 93 recommendations are being followed.

There are copies of the Recommendations at the Community Centre if you wish to be informed.


