Aylmer N Plain, published in 1975.**

**Re: A History of the Sarnia Indian Reserve.
Submitted by Marina D Plain**

Animikence "was one of the Chiefs who signed the treaty. He has a family and one son named "Misquahwegezhigk, " who is the father of O-zah-shke-da-wa meaning "on the Plain", who was left an orphan in early childhood and was adopted by a kindly old lady from across the river from Sarnia. He was eight years old when the treaty was signed in 1827 and was counted in the first enumeration of Sarnia and came across in the year 1834 and married one of ""Chepekun's daughters who died. One son James, survived this union and Ozshshedewa" (Christian name, Nicholas) married Zuakewen's daughter named Jemima, and out of this union came three sons and two daughters were born, Levi, Nicholas, Amos, Lucy and Susanna.

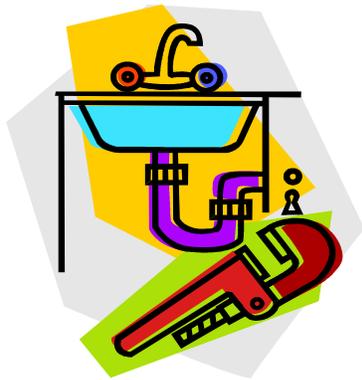

- It is a CMHC program for **LOW-INCOME** homeowners
- Provides loans, a part of which may not have to be paid back
 - Available to repair substandard living units

What repairs qualify my house?

- Your house must be substandard or deficient in one or more of the following:



- Structural
- Heating
- Disabled
- Electrical
- Fire Safety
- Plumbing

- Adaptations to make a unit accessible for a disabled occupant also qualifies for the Disabled RRAP program

Who is eligible?

- The **TOTAL** household's income must be lower than \$42,000.00.
Written verification of household income is required from all residence of the home.

The Inspector is available every Monday to do RRAP inspections. Please call the Housing Department at 519-336-8410. Deadline is September 30, 2015 to submit all required paperwork and quotes.

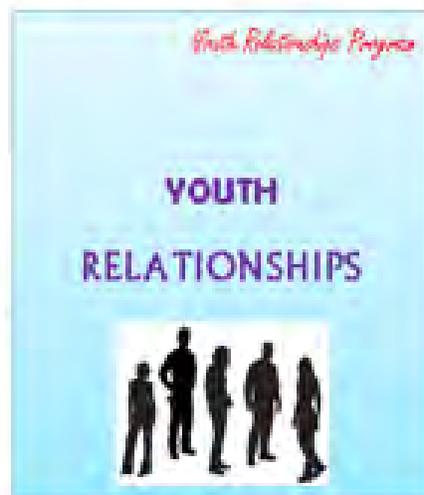

Naloxone kits reverse at least 14 overdoses since summer

Jerry Jackknife jokes he's not a super hero, just "a plain, ordinary hero," for helping save his friend's life.

Last fall, Jackknife was with a couple of friends at his house when one of them overdosed on heroin. He ran to his medicine cabinet and grabbed a naloxone kit he'd got at Streetworks, Edmonton's needle exchange.

He and his friend administered the drug, which can revive people who overdose on opioids such as fentanyl, morphine or heroin, and watched as she "snapped" back to life.

"She would have died if I hadn't had that kit," Jackknife, 59, a former opiate user, said Monday.

Jackknife learned how to use naloxone at Streetworks about three years ago. The organization has had an overdose prevention program since 2005 and became the first in Canada to distribute and train people to use the kits.

This summer, Alberta Health launched a year-long \$300,000 grant to fund take-home naloxone kits in response to the steep rise in deaths related to fentanyl, a dangerous opioid that's used in medical settings as a painkiller. In 2011, there were six deaths linked to fentanyl in Alberta; that's now up to more than 145 this year.

The funding covers 3,250 kits and the cost of a registered nurse one day a week at each of

participating organizations. The free kits are available at seven organizations across the province and are given to people who show they are at high risk of opioid overdoses. They must get a prescription as required by the federal government and take a brief training session.

At least 14 people have been saved from possibly fatal opioid overdoses and more than 150 kits have been distributed since the program launched this summer. The province's outgoing chief addiction and mental health officer Dr. Michael Trew said that's a great start, but there are still a lot of people who need the drug but aren't getting it.

"If we really want to save lives, we have to go beyond the injection drug users," he said, pointing out that opioids can be snorted and smoked and those people might not be frequenting needle exchanges.

"We know that some of the people who have died from this didn't know what they were taking and some of them did. Until the culture of abusing these kinds of substances shifts, we're going to have to figure out different ways of reaching out to the people who are really at risk."

Trew believes the program should be renewed and expanded to make naloxone available to more people who are at high-risk, such as party users, people who might be prone to relapse, First Nations and other isolated communities and prison inmates.

Streetworks program manager Marliiss Taylor would also like to see funding continue, a Good Samaritan law to protect drug users who call for help when they or a friend overdoses, and for naloxone to be affordable and available to people without a prescription.

"We need to flood society with naloxone in a lot of ways," she said.

Jackknife says he wouldn't hesitate if he had to use naloxone again. "I see what it does. It saves lives. It brings back a life."

Toronto overdose deaths jump dramatically

A 41% rise in nine years is blamed in part on increasing use of heroin and fentanyl.

Peter Leslie remembers that late spring day well.

While standing in the lobby of a Parkdale apartment building, someone told him a man was overdosing on heroin upstairs.

Leslie rushed into the apartment and was able to revive the unconscious man by injecting naloxone, an antidote to opioid drug overdoses, saving his life.

But many more people in Toronto were not so lucky.

Reported deaths from drug overdoses jumped dramatically between 2004 and 2013, according to Toronto Public Health. Numbers collected [in a report to be presented](#) next Tuesday show overdose deaths rose by 41 per cent in that period, from 146 in 2004 to 206 in 2013.

"This is a serious, almost plague-like situation," said Leslie, a former paramedic and harm reduction worker.

Ward 20 Councillor Joe Cressy, who is chair of Toronto Drug Strategy Implementation Panel, blamed the increase on rising use of opioids, including heroin [and fentanyl](#), a potent painkiller that can be abused in its patch form or ingested through an illegal pill or powder.

"Deaths due to overdose are on the increase in our city, and they needn't be," Cressy told the Star.

The city runs several programs to try to reduce overdoses, including distributing naloxone to people who use opioid drugs, he said. Leslie, who uses prescription opioid drugs for pain management, was given training and a naloxone kit through a Toronto Public Health Program.

To get naloxone, people must be known opioid drug users and complete the program.

Cressy believes it should be easier to access and available over the counter.

Natalie Kallio, harm reduction program lead at the Parkdale Community Health Centre, agrees. She said she's frustrated by the fact that naloxone isn't more easily available.

"We've lost some very beloved members of this community recently in quick succession," she said, of the overdoses she calls an "epidemic" in the neighbourhood.

"In every case there's a family, that we may or may not know about, that comes out and is just devastated."

Kallio said she's noticed an increase in overdoses, particularly in the last six months.

"There are a variety of reasons that people think it's happening," she said. One is that since OxyContin was taken off the market, people are replacing it with "whatever they can get."

In addition, "[fentanyl is obviously](#) a problem, and it's unstable," she said.

Kallio said she's frustrated by the fact that naloxone isn't more easily available.

Good Samaritan laws are needed to protect people from facing potential drug charges when they call 911 after someone they're with overdoses. "It's all preventable," she said.

Children must be taught to never touch a discarded needle, but to show an adult where it is. Adults can safely pick up and dispose of a found needle by following the steps below.

You will need:

- Pliers, tongs, or tweezers
- A non-breakable, puncture proof container with a screw-top lid – like a thick plastic jar, empty bleach or fabric softener bottle



Take the pliers and container to where the needle is.

Place the container on a stable surface.

Use the pliers to carefully pick up the needle.



Hold the needle tip away from you.

Be careful not to prick yourself with the needle.



Carefully put the needle into the container, needle end first.

Close the container tightly.

Wash your hands.



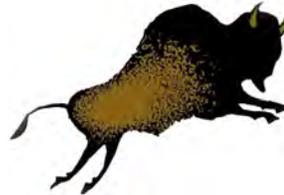

Anishinabek remember storyteller Basil Johnston

UOI OFFICES (Sept. 10, 2015) – Anishinabek today mourn the passing of storyteller, writer and educator who had devoted his career to the celebration and preservation of Anishinaabe heritage – Basil Johnston.

“He was a long-time friend who I played hockey with,” says Anishinabek Nation Grand Council Chief Patrick Madahbee. “He was a great storyteller. Basil kept you captivated with his great oratory skills. He was also an excellent historian. This is a great loss.”

Johnston, who is a citizen of Chippewas of Nawash, was born in Wasauksing First Nation. He had written 25 books in English – including *Ojibway Heritage* and *Ojibway Ceremonies* — and five in Anishinaabemowin.



He was honoured with the Anishinabek Nation Debwewin Citation for excellence in storytelling in 2012. He spent 25 years at the Ethnology Department of the Royal Ontario Museum with a focus on Anishinaabe heritage – particularly on recording language and mythology.

Over the years, Johnston had received many honours. He was a recipient of the 2013 Ontario Arts Council Aboriginal Arts Award, Order of Ontario, the 2004 National Aboriginal Achievement Award for Heritage and Spirituality and the 125th Anniversary of the Confederation of Canada Medal. He received honorary doctorates from the University of Toronto, Laurentian University and Brandon University.

The Anishinabek Nation established the Union of Ontario Indians as its secretariat in 1949. The UOI is a political advocate for 39 member communities across Ontario, representing approximately 60,000 people. The Union of Ontario Indians is the oldest political organization in Ontario and can trace its roots back to the Confederacy of Three Fires, which existed long before European contact.

Some initiatives of the green house will be Native plant rescue and restoration, seed collection and cleaning, native plant propagation, multi-generation teaching and learning, ecology stewardship education, and reconnecting with the Earth. The greenhouse will also be a gathering place for learning how to help native plants thrive once planted. There will be upcoming workshops coming in 2016 to learn how to take care of native plants, as well as what to plant where, and purposes for traditional medicinal plants. A full time greenhouse caretaker job posting is being created and further details will be posted in an upcoming Tribe Une. 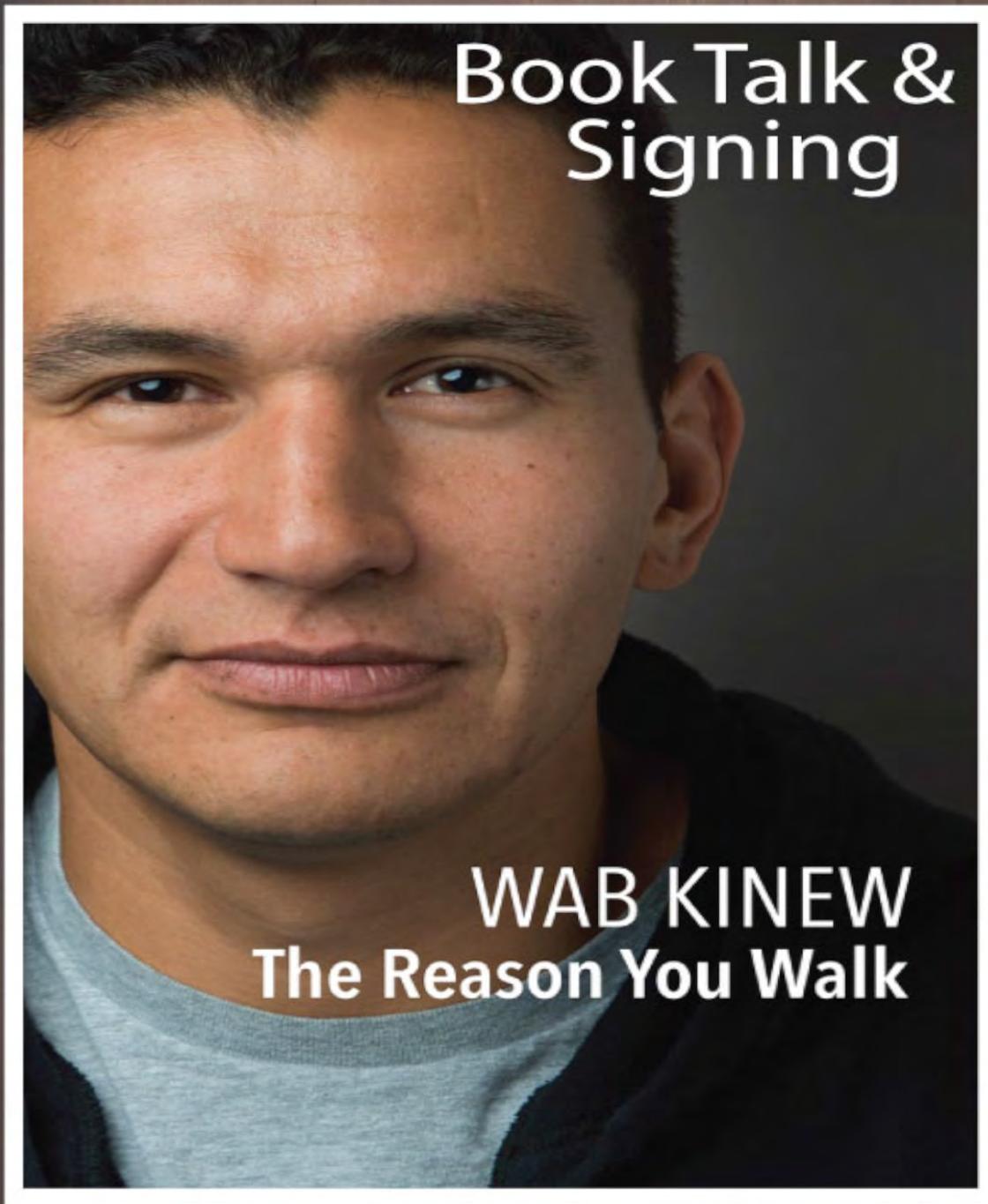

The ancestors visioned the Sweatlodge as a gift from The Creator to help in healing, purification, and connection to the spirit world. The Sweatlodge "Womb of Mother Earth" is connected to all directional powers of the universe: above, below, east, north, west and south. Intent within integrity is the key to the positive outcome of the ceremony. It is said that the Sweatlodge ceremony "responds" to what the people need.

The sweat will be conducted by a visiting Healer/Elder, Richard Assinewaj.

This will be a Co-ed (mixed) sweat.

PROTOCOL FOR THE SWEATLODGE CEREMONY

An offering of tobacco and a gift is made to the sweatlodge conductor. The offering is used to help in the costs of the wood and gas (where applicable). One would need to abstain from alcohol or drugs for at least four days prior to the sweat, however under circumstances, this may be over looked. It is important that you inform the sweatlodge conductor of any health problems such as asthma or high blood pressure.

WHAT TO WEAR AND BRING TO THE SWEATLODGE CEREMONY:

Tobacco

Towel or small blanket

Men wear longer boxing style swimming trunks or shorts without metal.

Women wear long dress-like garments-could be a long nightgown or T-shirt and long skirt together

Water and a snack to share with others after the Sweatlodge (offering)

Women on their moon-time (menstruation cycle) will sit outside the lodge as they are naturally purifying.

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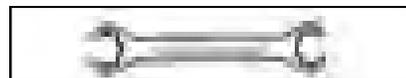
