Notice to Tobacco Retailers

RE: Retailer allocation for 2016-17 and continuance of a per carton surcharge in the amount of \$2.00 per carton.

Dear Retailers:

Please be advised that at the Regular Council Meeting held on March 21, 2016, Chief and Council passed a motion assigning quota cigarettes to retailers for the 2016-17 fiscal year.

Last year retailers were required to pay a \$1.00 surcharge per carton, as recommended by the Tobacco Allocation Committee. The surcharge for the 2016-17 fiscal year will be \$2.00 per carton, any increases thereafter will be determined by Council. The surcharge is payable to the Aamjiwnaang First Nation at the Finance Office in the Band Office.

This amount is due on or before March 10, 2017. **If a retailer fails to pay the full amount of the surcharge before this date, they will be ineligible to apply for quota allocation in the 2016-17 fiscal year.**

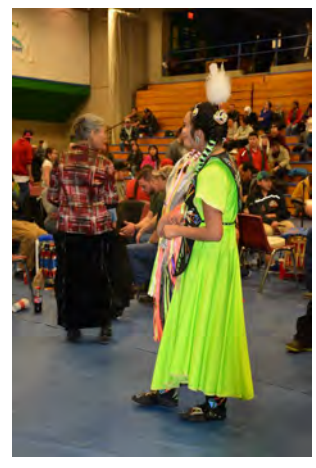

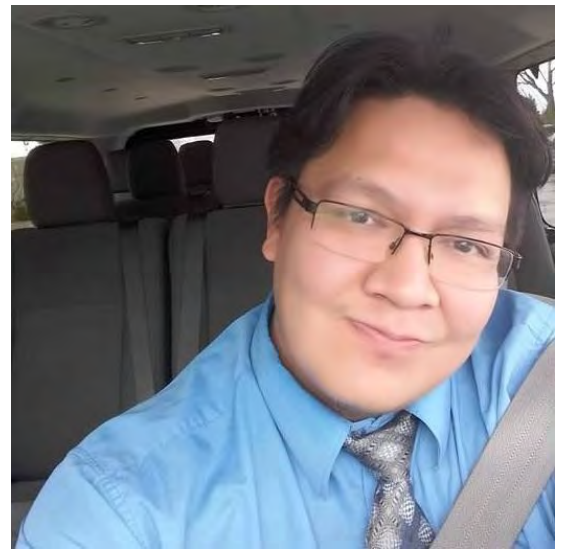

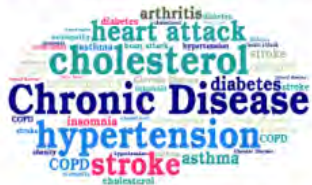

2014 Aamjiwnaang First Nation Air Monitoring Report

The Ministry of the Environment and Climate Change recently released its sixth annual report on air quality at the Aamjiwnaang First Nation.






The Aamjiwnaang First Nation community air monitoring station was established in 2008 in partnership between the Aamjiwnaang First Nation and the provincial and federal governments. The station monitors for sulphur dioxide, nitrogen dioxide, fine particulate matter, volatile organic compounds and many other air contaminants

The report presents the results of the data collected at the Aamjiwnaang community air monitoring station in 2014, and compares the levels of contaminants measured to Ontario’s Ambient Air Quality Criteria (AAQC).

Air sampling results indicated that contaminant levels measured at Aamjiwnaang in 2014 met the AAQC in most instances. Exceedances of the AAQC were seen for ozone, benzene, and benzo[a]pyrene. Elevated levels of fine particulate matter were also observed.

2014 Air Monitoring - Key Results

Other results were generally similar to previous years and to findings in other communities in southwestern Ontario. However, benzene and 1,3-butadiene concentrations were higher in Aamjiwnaang and Sarnia than in surrounding communities.

While levels of benzene in the Sarnia area have greatly decreased over the last 20 years, findings show the 2014 annual average benzene concentration at Aamjiwnaang represents a 9.2% increase from the previous highest annual average observed in the first year of monitoring (2008/2009). The ministry does not expect adverse health effects related to exposure to air concentrations of benzene measured at the Aamjiwnaang First Nation air monitoring station. However, these recent findings reinforce the need for actions to be taken to reduce benzene levels in the community.

Through collaboration with communities, environmental groups, First Nations and industry, Ontario is developing proposed technical standards for the petroleum refining and petrochemical sectors that will require industries to take progressive actions, such as investing in best available technology to reduce benzene and 1,3-butadiene emissions.

The ministry is working to improve air quality by ensuring facilities are in compliance with regulatory requirements, using monitoring and modelling programs to improve understanding of benzene emissions. It also plans to strengthen direction for facilities during start-ups, shut-downs, and process upsets.

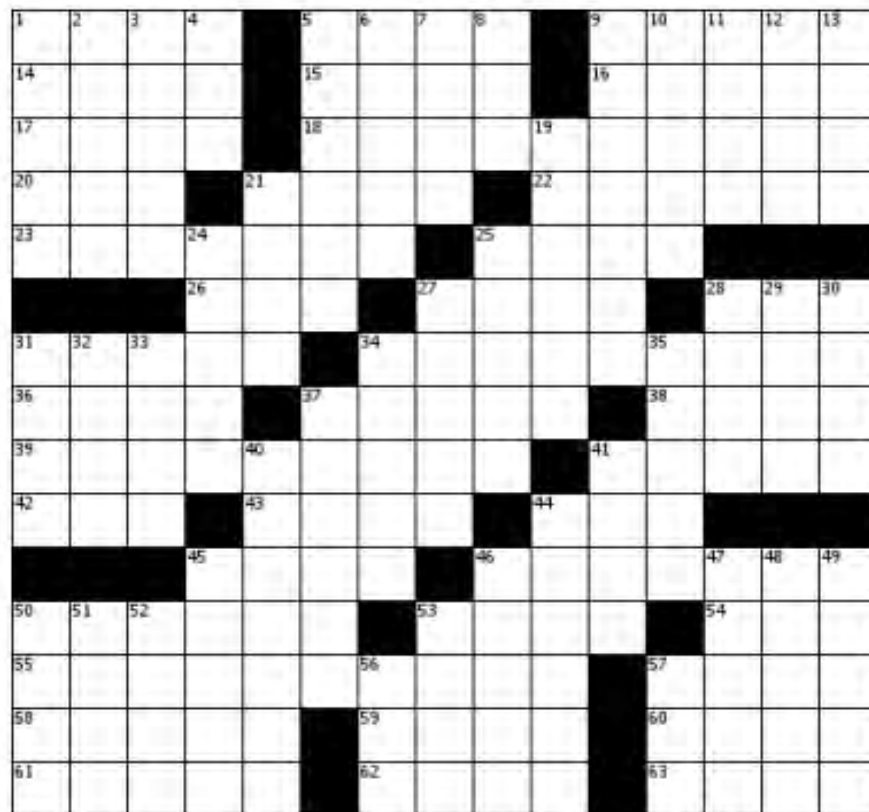

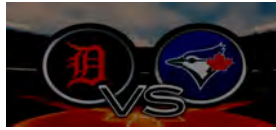
