FYI - Health Benefits under Indigenous Services Canada

The Non-Insured Health Benefits Program (NIHB) - (Indigenous Services Canada) is a National Program administered by Health Canada providing coverage for:

Dental, Drugs, Medical Supplies & Equipment, Medical Transportation, Vision Care, and Short-Term Crisis Intervention Mental Health Counselling.

Using your Benefits: When you present your status card to any health provider, as if they bill directly to NIHB before obtaining the service. Ensure the health care provider verifies that the product/treatment is an eligible benefit listed on NIHB

Be Aware: If you are asked to pay upfront, it can take 6-8 weeks to be reimbursed, and you may not get reimbursed if the benefit was not pre-approved. You may want to seek out a provider that does bill directly to NIHB. The Drug or product may be an exception benefit requiring the provider to call the Drug Exception Centre at 1-800-580-0950

Benefits Outside of Canada: You must purchase travel health insurance if you travel outside of Canada. If you are a migrant worker or a full time student working or studying outside of Canada, call NIHB to ask about coverage at 1-800-640-0642. 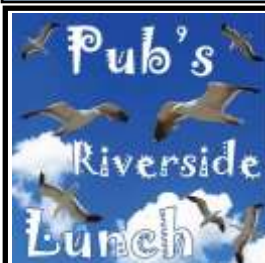

COMMUNITY UPDATE

June 27, 2023

Community Members:

I want to provide a brief update on some Council projects currently underway. As you are aware much work has been done in the recreation park area. In addition to the ball diamond being refurbished and the multiplex sports pad, a new playground was added, and some additional work will take place as the finishing touches are added to this area. Sunshades, pavilions, and work at the dog park will be added, as well as a walking trail.

This work was done in addition to the new Child and Family Services and Education buildings where additional parking and water/sewer upgrades were done as well.

Survey work has been completed for a sidewalk/bike path along Tashmoo, and we are waiting on tender documents from City Engineering.

Aamjiwnaang will be adding a new cemetery identified by the community as a need. An extension of Virgil Ave. will provide access to the chosen area north of the Chippewa subdivision.

The three-plex Seniors unit is completed, and vacancies will be filled soon. An 8-plex apartment building is being planned in the apartment complex area, and Council has also purchased a 5-plex townhouse unit in Sarnia that will be available for rent after renovations take place.

Access to the fishing pier will be upgraded to include wheelchair and scooter access. This work has taken a long time to complete due to the design required, finding a contractor, and price increases due to covid. The Environment Dept has led this initiative and I appreciate their perseverance in seeing this through.

Work has commenced on a new two bed Hospice. This facility will be located on the River Road, will be a nice addition to our Health Department as they will have the ability to provide end-of-life care in the community, a wish we hear so often. This will be a beautiful building designed and being built by community members, much like all the construction projects recently added to our community. These projects have all come in under budget, under the strong leadership of Project Manager Steve DeGurse.

Political pressure will continue to address the benzene exposure, Metis encroachment, and also to have reserve status added to the Jacobs lot, so we can start development.

Purpose of the Position

To maintain and ensure a high standard of cleanliness for Aamjiwnaang First Nation in all public and staff areas in our buildings as part of a team. Team Cleaners will clean the following buildings, Seniors Building, Annex, Resource Centre, Public Works, Fieldhouse, Administration (Band Office), Education Centre/Portable, Social Services Building and the Health Centre.

Responsibilities

Within Aamjiwnaang we have Team Cleaning specialists that are independently deployed in a systematic method and perform assigned cleaning tasks in designated areas based on allotted time. By focusing primarily on one type of work, each Team Cleaning member becomes more skilled, more effective at the job, and more knowledgeable about proper safety procedures for that job. Each specialist role involves specific tools and tasks, as well as performance standards.

There are four distinct positions within our Team Cleaning (all of Team Cleaners will be trained on each specialized area):

Light-duty Specialist

- Empties the trash and recycling bins
- Dusts and disinfects all horizontal surfaces
- Cleans telephones

TOXIC IMAGES: VISUAL REPRESENTATION OF INDUSTRIAL CONTAMINATION AND FRONTLINE COMMUNITIES

A research project proposal from
Laurence Butet-Roch, PhD Student, Environmental Studies, York University



WHY IS THIS PROJECT BEING DONE?

This project explores how people living in Aamjiwnaang First Nation feel about photos of their communities that have been published in Canadian news publications. The overarching objective of this study is to determine how best to bear witness to the harms of industrial contamination and advocate for environmental justice without perpetuating stereotypes and damaging narratives. More specifically it seeks to:

1. Create useful and practical tools to encourage reporters to adopt the recommendations identified throughout the research project and conduct their work in a better way.
2. Shift public perceptions of Aamjiwnaang by encouraging local and national news publication to move away from damage-centered reporting and emphasize that it is a vibrant community that deserves to be protected through the enactment of appropriate environmental legislations.
3. Allow Aamjiwnaang community members to further their awareness of how their community is represented in mainstream news publication and address the discrepancies they observe.
4. Further develop the critical visual literacy of Aamjiwnaang community members and give them the tools to determine how they want to be portrayed in the media and to ensure that their wishes are respected.

WHAT IS INVOLVED IN THIS STUDY?

This study involves two 2-hours workshops and one hour and a half workshop. You can choose to participate in any or all of them. During the first, you will be asked to draw or write on existing photos of Aamjiwnaang First Nation and share how you feel about how Aamjiwnaang First Nation is portrayed in Canadian news publication. The second will focus on devising and designing a way to let Canadian news publication know how you wish they would interact with and depict Aamjiwnaang First Nation. The third will ask you to review the dissemination materials and provide feedback. You are free to opt out of any workshop activity at any time or choose not to respond any of the prompts.

WHO IS THE RESEARCHER?

I'm a documentary photographer from Tsihikika/Montreal currently living in Toronto/Toronto, and a PhD Student in Environmental Studies at York University. My relationship with Aamjiwnaang First Nation dates to December 2010, when I was invited by to assist in a Photovoice project. Since then, I've continued to visit multiple times a year, building strong relationships with various community members, and working on a photographic essay about the community. In 2016, I was invited to organize and activity at the Enviro-Day fair, where community members wrote and drew on some of the photographs I made. This became the inspiration for my research project.



WHEN AND WHERE WILL THE WORKSHOPS TAKE PLACE?

The workshops will take place in person at the Aamjiwnaang First Nation Community Centre.

- July 14th, 5pm-7pm: Dinner Meet and Greet
- July 15th, 11am-1pm: Elaborate Image Workshop (annotate and draw on a collection of images of Aamjiwnaang published in the news)
- July 16th, 11am-1pm: Dissemination Design Workshop (share your thoughts and prototype strategies to share your recommendations)
- July 29th, 11am-1pm: Peer Review (provide feedback on the dissemination materials)

ARE THERE ANY RISKS?

There are minimal risks to you in this study. You will be asked to look at and comment on photos of Aamjiwnaang, which sometimes depict the community in a less than favourable light, which can be upsetting, distressing, and demoralizing. You will also be participating in group activities with other participants, during which you might disagree with the opinions of others. To facilitate these conversations, we will build a space based on mutual respect and understanding. You are also free to opt out of any workshop activity at any time or choose not to respond any of the prompts. And, there will be a separate space with food and beverages if you feel like you need a break.

WHAT ABOUT BENEFITS?

If you agree to take part in this research, there may or may not be direct benefits to you. You will grow your awareness of how Aamjiwnaang First Nation is represented in mainstream news publication and develop your critical visual literacy, as well as your ability to communicate with journalists. You will also receive a \$50 honorarium for your participation in the form of a gift certificate. Food and beverages will be served. Reimbursement or arrangements for transportation to and from the community centre will be offered.

WHAT ABOUT CONFIDENTIALITY?

You can choose whether to keep your identity confidential (I will give you a pseudonym), or to have your identity included in the study. You can inform me of this decision at any time during the research. And you will have the opportunity to review any of the materials pertaining to you before it is made public.

WHAT WILL YOU DO WITH THE WORKSHOP MATERIAL?

I will analyse the results of the workshops as part of my PhD research, some of which may be included in my dissertation, future publications, and conference presentations. We will also work together to design ways to share best practices with local and national journalists.

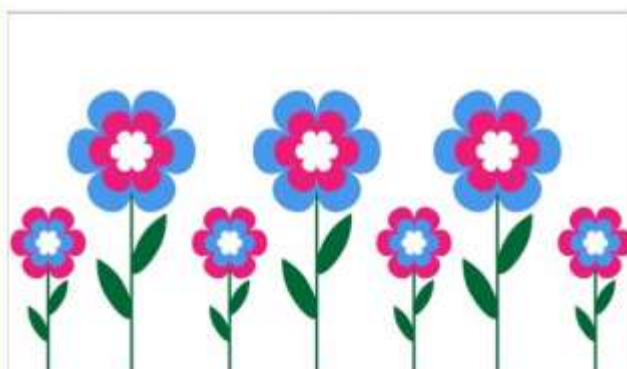

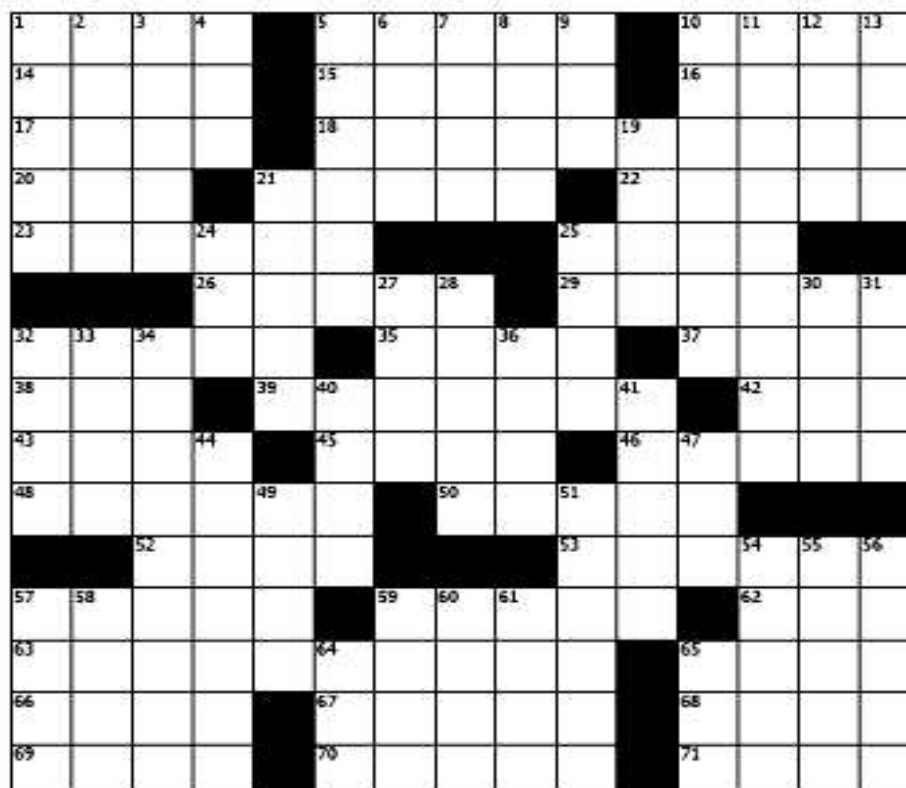
