Dental, Drugs, Medical Supplies & Equipment, Medical Transportation, Vision Care, and Short-Term Crisis Intervention Mental Health Counselling.

Using you Benefits: When you present your status card to any health provider, as if they bill directly to NIHB before obtaining the service. Ensure the health care provider verifies that the product/treatment is an eligible benefit listed on NIHB

Be Aware: If you are asked to pay upfront, it can take 6-8 weeks to be reimbursed, and you may not get reimbursed if the benefit was not pre-approved. You may want to seek out a provider that does bill directly to NIHB. The Drug or product may be an exception benefit requiring the provider to call the Drug Exception Centre at 1-800-580-0950

Benefits Outside of Canada: You must purchase travel health insurance if you travel outside of Canada. 



To deliver homecare to the Aamjiwnaang First Nation community members. Homecare services include: Respite care, housekeeping services, meal preparation, personal care, assistance with routine activities of daily living, simple non-nursing bedside care, and childcare for children whose regular care taker is absent or recovering as a result of illness or accident. Reports to and works under the direction of the Home and Community Care Program Supervisor.

Responsibilities:

- Experience and knowledge in meeting the needs of clients and /or families.
- Following the care plan, observing and reporting any substantial findings and/or changes in the client's behavior to the
 appropriate member of the healthcare team.
- Working under the supervision of a Registered Healthcare Professional such as a Registered Nurse (RN) or a Registered Practical Nurse (RPN).
- Performing delegated tasks (only if they are trained to perform the delegated task).
- Assisting with ambulation, positioning and transferring using mechanical lifts.
- Assisting or providing total personal care such as toileting, bathing and perineal care.
- Assisting with eating, dressing and grooming.
- Documentation of Activities of Daily Living (ADL's) and other findings.
- Reporting behavioral and clinical changes to a Registered Nurse, Registered Practical Nurse, Resource Nurse or Supervisor.

The Classroom Teacher provides a quality, caring and supportive educational program for the students of Aamjiwnaang Kinoomaage Gamig (school). We are a small community school (Kindergarten – Grade 3) implementing the Ministry of Education curriculum with the Anishinaabek Education System. This position reports to the Education Coordinator.

Responsibilities

- To perform the duties of teacher and demonstrate academic competence across the curriculum.
- To supervise and provide a quality program (in-class/outdoors) that is appropriate.
- To provide physical, social, cognitive, emotional and skill development for students.
- To provide a caring, stimulating learning environment for the students.

THE IMPORTANCE OF WRITING A WILL IN OUR COMMUNITIES

"AWill is a document that gives us a voice after we have passed. It empowers us to make important decisions for our families and the community at large.

A Will is essential in planning for our next 7 generations"

Estate planning is most likely something that doesn't cross your mind on a day-to-day basis. It might even be something we avoid or don't want to think about let alone talk about.

These may be some of the most uncomfortable discussions we have with our families. However, I would like to shine light on the empowerment of Estate Planning. I am going to share a few reasons why this process is so crucial in helping to prepare for our future generations and the importance of having a voice after we have completed our journey here on earth. My wish is that we can sit down together and make these most careful considerations.

In Aamjiwnaang, and many other communities across Canada, the reality is that we are governed by the Indian Act. This is true for many aspects of our lives including the time of our death. When we pass on, if we don't have a will; our bank accounts, property, personal belongings and any other assets will be divided according to the Indian Act. In most cases, the Indian Act does not satisfy the needs of the family nor the community as a whole and in worst cases causes division, land that sits in limbo and years of unsettled estates.

There are many stories that may came to mind that you have heard in our community or surrounding communities. It is all too common that death in the family comes with burden and division amongst family members. This trickles down into tying up land in the community when a family can't come to an agreement.

You may have thought in the beginning of this article, how could Estate Planning or Writing a Will possibly be empowering? Well, aside from the Indian Act and stories of the past, it's important to recognize that we have every right to make sure that our voices are being heard, even after our death.

We are able to take the burden off our families and make important decisions for the future. What are you leaving behind and how would you like it to be dispersed? How would you like your family to continue once you have gone on? Although these are difficult discussions, it makes for an easier process following your absence. Not to mention your last wishes leave direction and guidance; all in which are not only comforting but completely necessary.

We may have never thought of a Will in this light. The truth is that we are the ancestors of the future our say is needed for the younger generations to carry on. This is true even with something that seems small such as our personal property and assets.

WHEN THERE IS NO WILL IN PLACE WHO INHERITS?

How Possessions will be dispersed according to the Indian Act:

Applicable to First Nation Members living on Reserve at the time of death

Who Inherits?

This depends on whether the person who has passed had a spouse or was living with a common-law partner for at least a year.

Common-law means making a life together without being married. In order to inherit, a common-law partner must have been living with the person who died for at least one year before the death.

Spouse or common-law partner

Who gets the property depends on the value of the estate.

The estate includes cash, investments, retirement benefits, furniture, land, etc. The debts are subtracted from this amount. The person settling the estate determines the value of the property and debts.

The estate is worth \$75,000 or less

Everything goes to the spouse or common-law partner who had been living for at least a year with the person who has passed.

The Estate is worth more than \$75,000

No children

Everything goes to the spouse or common-law partner.

One Child

 \$75,000 goes to the spouse or common-law partner.

The rest of the estate is divided this way:

- 1/2 to the spouse or common-law partner
- 1/2 to the child

Two or More Children

 \$75,000 goes to the spouse or common-law partner.

The rest of the estate is divided this way:

- 1/3 to the spouse or common-law partner
- · 2/3 distributed equally among the children
