SECURITY GUARD TRAINING

Complete a 40 hour Security Licence Training Program with a First Aid and CPR Certification and receive your Training Completion Number

The Hughes Intelligence Security Guard Training Course meets the Ontario requirements for security guard training. It covers all the requirements and is designed to fully prepare you for the Ontario exam. The course is easy to follow and engaging with a practice test that lets you gauge your own readiness for the licensing exam.

Upon completion of the security guard training course, you will receive a Training Completion Number which you will need to register for the Ontario Security Guard exam.

To be eligible for an Ontario security guard licence you must:

- · Be 18 years of age or older
- Have a clean criminal record
- Complete the mandatory training and exam requirements
 - Have a current Emergency First Aid/CPR certificate

If you have been convicted (and not pardoned) of any of the 80+ criminal offences listed in the Ontario regulation, Eligibility to Hold a Licence - Clean Criminal Record, you will not be able to obtain or renew a security guard license.

Overview of the Position

The Governance Officer oversees all governance initiatives as determined by Aamjiwnaang Chief and Council strategic plan, assists with the development of legal and regulatory compliance of community laws and by-laws and applicable organization policies and procedures with a focus on mitigating risk.

All employees are to work in compliance with the Occupational Health and Safety Act.

Responsibilities

1. Systems and Operations

- Assisting in the development and implementation of the Chief and Council strategic plan through:
- Effective reporting and provide strategic advice on the implementation
- Effective implementation of the Comprehensive Community Plan and Leadership Strategic Plan
- Maintain and provide accurate records and documents of relevance
- Collaboratively work with Chief and Council, Aamjiwnaang Administration and local Provincial Territorial Organization's (PTO's)
- Assist in the establishment of new governance and management procedures as they relate to the Aamjiwnaang Chi'Naaknigewin
- Assess strengths and weaknesses, strategy, and governance, and their impact while identifying opportunities and risks
- Ensure accuracy and compliance with relevant legislation
- Steering the governance and leadership capacity development services
- Assist in planning program and services for advisory services and develop funding proposals as directed
- Support the process in identifying funding
- Prepare an annual work plan detailing, goals, projects and timelines for activities assigned that
 is in line with the strategic direction of the organization
- Responsible to maintain and report on all financial transaction related to governance

Administration

- Ensure the requirements and practice of governance and risk management framework are embedded throughout the organization
- Monitor external Indigenous governance initiatives and participate as a technical resource within AFN (and other) governance as required
- Regularly review governance processes, policies, and procedures, focusing on continuous improvement
- Attend Band Council meetings and other meetings as directed by the Band Manager

- · Act as a liaison between Chief and Council, Administration, and Band Members as required
- Provide conference, workshop, and meeting planning support to ensure successful planning and execution of general and committee meetings
- Ability to lead/facilitate meetings
- Ensure that all business of governance, are conducted in a responsible, confidential, and ethical way
- Other duties as assigned.

Minimum Requirements

- Appropriate post-secondary qualifications (diploma or degree equivalent) in governance, policy and risk management, or equivalent experience

Scope of the Position

The Early Childhood Educator will provide a quality caring and supportive child care program to members of the Aamjiwnaang community. You will be responsible for the academic, social-emotional growth and development of all children in your care, which may include infant/toddlers and/or preschool age children; develops partnerships with parents and caregivers, in accordance with the goals and curriculum plans of the centre and the philosophy and polices of the Centre and in compliance with the Child Care and Early Years Act. This position reports to the Child Care Centre Supervisor.

Responsibilities

- Plan, carry out, and assess developmentally appropriate activities and experiences in harmony with the centre's philosophy
 - Provide a daily balance of active/quiet, indoor/outdoor, and individual/group activities
 - Establish and carry out a daily activity schedule that incorporates child directed activity, care
 routines and transition times
 - Organize space, equipment and materials before activities
 - Assist children in expressing themselves by listening and responding with questions or comments that extend conversations
 - Aid in promotion of language and culture
 - Use a variety of teaching techniques including modelling, observing, questioning, demonstrating, and reinforcing
 - Encourage and assist children to practice self help daily
 - Plan and carry out experiences that foster an understanding of a variety of cultures and value systems
 - Provide opportunity for child directed play experience
 - Plan and carry out activities that encourage problem solving
 - Provide experiences and play materials that actively promote diversity and acceptance in interactions and attitudes
 - Participate in short and long term planning and evaluation and staff program reviews
 - Learn and use the activities and skills provided to assist children in developing the necessary coping skills for addressing unique life issues
- Individualize the curriculum
 - Set Observe how children use materials and interact with each other and adults
 - Use observations to expand play and plan activities that recognize individual difference
 - Initiate referrals or additional services for parents and children
- Ensure guidance of children's behaviour that encourages positive self-concept.
 - Set reasonable behaviour expectations consistent with center's philosophy and policies

- · Provide positive guidelines such as redirecting, positive language, and positive reinforcement
- Immediately address problem behaviour without labelling the child
- Follow behaviour guidance and policies established by the centre and consistent with accepted practice in the field
- 4. Ensure the child's environment is healthy and safe
 - Follow the centre's procedures for administering medications and maintaining health records
 - Report all accidents, injuries and illnesses to the supervisor or delegate and record such incidents in the daily log book and as a serious occurrence if necessary
 - Monitor the environment for hazards
 - Update self daily on children's allergies and other special conditions
 - Establish daily eating routines that are fun for children
 - Attend to children's physical needs for toileting, diapering, eating and sleeping as promptly as possible
- Ensure positive communication with parents
 - Plan for parent conferences
 - Discuss the programs daily events and the child's daily progress with parents
 - Accommodate the parent's instructions for daily routines when possible within group routines
 - Encourage parents to participate whenever possible
- Contribute to the ongoing operations of the centre
 - Follow licensing requirements
 - Carry out the responsibilities assigned to you
 - Attend regular staff meetings
 - · Maintain confidentiality of all information related to the centre's children, their parents, and staff
 - · Plan and carry out annual personal development
 - Keep up to date with early childhood advocacy developments
 - Maintain regular attendance and punctuality
- 7. Promote the centre within the community
 - Actively participate in Aamjiwnaang staff activities whenever possible
 - Maintain a positive working relationship with other Aamjiwnaang staff and others who work within the building

- Ability to build trust and positive relationships with families in the program
- Act as a role model of appropriate behaviour

Position Summary

Under the direction of the Education Coordinator, the Child Care Supervisor assumes responsibility for the day to day operation of the Child Care Centre. The Supervisor is responsible for program planning, working effectively with staff, working with families and children, connecting with the community, mentoring students and administrative responsibilities related to the day to day operation of the Child Care Centre. The Supervisor is responsible for providing leadership to ensure a quality, culturally appropriate childcare service.

Responsibilities

Administrative responsibilities related to the day to day operation of the Child Care Centre:

- Assists the Education Coordinator in the development and monitoring of the Child Care Centre's Budget.
- Endorses the ABKM program statement and adheres to the policies, directives, and plans.
- Maintains a safe, healthy, and welcoming environment for children.
- Main contact for parents and caregivers
- Maintains enrollment and child records
- Ensure adequate records are maintained and compiled
- Responsible for program staff schedules
- Consults with parents/caregivers and staff on each child's participation and progress
- Develops and maintains a work plan based on the overall goals of ABKM; other reports as required.
- · Maintains provincial standards of the CCEYA and makes policy recommendations as required
- Encourage parental involvement in the childcare centre

Child Care Program Development, Planning and Implementation:

- Plan and implement a program that reflects the philosophy of the ABKM.
- Monitoring the childcare program to ensure compliance with the CCEYA.
- Provide mentoring, training, assigning, and scheduling for staff, students, and volunteers.
- Responsible for designing, implementing, and supervising community/parent/family activities and available to work evenings as required.
- Monitors activities for assessing, detecting, problems, identifying trends, providing new and innovative initiatives, and makes recommendations to improvement.
- Ensures that Indigenous culture and language concepts are embedded into the curriculum and daily activities.

Staff Supervision:

- Conduct monthly staff meetings and support professional development.
- Provide support and direction to educators regarding child development.
- Provide feedback and input to the Education Coordinator for annual appraisals for each educator and all other Centre employees

- Assist the Education Coordinator with hiring process and make recommendations on staffing.
- Ensure that all staff comply with the policies and procedures
- Performs such other related duties as may reasonably be required by the Coordinator.

Minimum Requirements

- A member in good standing of the College of Early Childhood Educators, with at least 2 years' experience providing licensed childcare and working knowledge of the Child Care and Early Years Act.
- · Strong leadership skills and/or supervisor experience an asset
- Ability to build and foster relationships with staff, families, Chief and Council, volunteers and community resources.

Scope of the Position

The Manager of Development is responsible for the leadership of economic development, lands and environment, pipelines, and corporate initiatives undertaken on behalf of the Aamjiwnaang First Nation (AFN). This role is responsible for improving AFN's capacity for sustainable economic growth, seeking economic diversification, and working collaboratively with both internal and external groups. The Manager of Development focuses on opportunities and development priorities to grow the economy and support AFN's economic priorities. This role is also responsible for the management of oversight of the Lands Office and Land Registry related to reserve lands. The role provides supervision, oversight, and direction to the Development department staff, Environment department staff, Lands department staff and contributes to the strategic and business planning for AFN.

Responsibilities

- 1. Development Leadership
 - Identify, lead, and manage community and economic development planning and initiatives; identifying and fostering community economic development opportunities; securing funding for economic development activities and programs; assisting local organizations, businesses, and individuals, with establishing economic development plans and projects
 - Oversee the conservation and protection of the air, land, and water environments initiatives for AFN
 - Engage in and develop the Strategic Business Plan for AFN based on engagement and input from members of the community, public, Chief and Council
 - · Recommend strategic initiatives, and identify opportunities for further economic development
 - Accountable for providing strategic and operational leadership on all aspects of development
 - Promote and champion the AFN community to expand economic development opportunities
 - Provide expert input and advice on short- and long-term economic development strategies and business plans that align with the AFN's stated goals, objectives, and vision
 - Develop the annual work plan, report and budget based on identified priorities and requirements
 of partner funding entities
 - Identify and provide oversight and management of applications for grants and funding opportunities or partnerships available to further the economic development goals / initiatives of the community
 - Remain informed of Provincial and Federal initiatives and communicate this information to Chief, Committee, Council, and program staff as needed
 - Build alliances and partnerships with strategic external stakeholders including government representatives, organizations, and funders to advance AFN's economic goals and objectives
 - Establish and maintain strong interpersonal relationships internally and with external stakeholders by using effective negotiating skills to reconcile differences, influence outcomes and bring people together for a shared purpose

- Liaise with other departments and various internal services to ensure that a cooperative and integrated level of service is provided
- Manage and plan development projects, engaging with a variety of industrial and commercial enterprises, community and business associations, and government agencies
- Oversight of corporations assigned to the Corporation Manager, ensuring planning, development, coordination, and implementation satisfies shareholders and tenants
- Ensure that corporations are preserved and increase the value and integrity of the properties and to meet the financial objectives of the board of directors and shareholders
- Identify, review, and assign commercial or industrial development proposals, providing strategic advice on procedures and approval requirements
- Ensure social and economic profiles of AFN urban and rural areas are updated and accurate to encourage investment and development in the community
- Utilize data, metrics, and research to make sound, well-informed, and objective decisions
- Conduct frequent research and analysis

2. People Management

- Provide leadership and direction to the Development department, Environment department and Lands department
- Supervise and support direct reports to ensure and foster wellbeing in a cooperative working environment
- Direct staff in accordance with policies, procedures, and systems in place, ensuring that staff conduct themselves in a professional manner in dealing with Aamjiwnaang Band members, staff, and the public
- Provide guidance, coaching, support, and training and development opportunities while engaging direct reports in goal setting and performance evaluation
- Manage all aspects of scheduling, including time off requests and ensuring adequate staffing coverage
- Work closely with Human Resources to manage hiring, discipline, or termination of direct reports
- Oversee new hires and onboarding process

Health and Safety Compliance

- Ensure workplace health and safety by identifying prevention opportunities, ensuring staff are trained in incident reporting systems, investigating potential risk and accidents, and applying timely corrective measures
- Maintain awareness of relevant legislation, policies, and procedures
- Adhere to policies of Aamjiwnaang First Nation, along with relevant economic development, reserve lands, employment, and other legislative requirements

4. Finance and Administration

- Oversee Full Cycle financial management to ensure financial accountability and the efficient utilization of all health resources
- Manage the departmental budget, including identifying new opportunities for revenue and approving spending requests
- (In Partnership with) Development of funding proposals, including planning, writing, and implementation
- Complete reporting related to budget and funding obligations, including financial, statistical, and qualitative
- Manage all funding and partnership contracts related to economic development and reserve lands
- Attend appropriate workshops, seminars and training sessions as required to remain current on topics of concern to the department and scope responsibility
- · Attend all management, Committee, Council, and community meetings as required

Minimum Requirements

- Degree or diploma in business, economics, political sciences, finance, or a related field; master's degree preferred
- 7 to 10 years' experience in economic development including planning, organizing, directing, and managing
- 5 to 7 years' experience supervising staff
- Minimum of 5 years' experience (work or lived) in First Nations, understanding the needs, challenges, and political environment
- · Completion of Reserve Land and Environment Management Certification Program considered an asset
- Experience in project management
- Experience in government relations and advanced funding/reporting obligations
- A clear Criminal Record Check and Vulnerable Sector Check
- A valid driver's license and access to a vehicle

Knowledge, Skills, and Abilities

- Thorough knowledge of First Nations economic and environmental initiatives and how that impacts the AFN community
- Able to navigate and demonstrate knowledge of First Nations bylaws, politics and specific issues related to development
- Thorough knowledge of and ability to demonstrate / apply core First Nations values to design culturally appropriate services
- Working knowledge of governmental policies, programs, services, and procedures at the Federal, Provincial, and Regional, levels that relate to economic development and reserve lands
- Able to navigate and demonstrate knowledge of First Nations politics and specific issues related to economic development and reserve lands
- Extensive knowledge of and adherence to relevant Acts, Regulations, policies, procedures, and codes related economic development and reserve lands

Using you Benefits: When you present your status card to any health provider, as if they bill directly to NIHB before obtaining the service. Ensure the health care provider verifies that the product/treatment is an eligible benefit listed on NIHB

Be Aware: If you are asked to pay upfront, it can take 6-8 weeks to be reimbursed, and you may not get reimbursed if the benefit was not preapproved. You may want to seek out a provider that does bill directly to NIHB. The Drug or product may be an exception benefit requiring the provider to call the Drug Exception Centre at 1-800-580-0950

Benefits Outside of Canada: You must purchase travel health insurance if you travel outside of Canada.
