Eligible Members please note:

- To update or verify mailing addresses or direct deposit information, please contact the Finance department at (519) 336-8410 or email finance@aamjiwnaang.ca.
- Calculation for distribution is based on a percentage of last year's own source revenue, such as wind farms and pipelines, that was not committed to operating Band programs.

Arrears

- Be advised we will be enforcing the Finance Policy for anyone having an account with Aamjiwnaang that is not in good standing (ex. Housing, Post secondary, etc). We will be applying the distribution cheque to the outstanding account.
- No minor children's shares will be held for arrears.

Payments for minor children will be made as follows:

- Payments for minor children will be made to the biological custodial parent, provided that person is an Aamjiwnaang Band member.
- Payments for minor children whose biological custodial parent is not an Aamjiwnaang Band member will be held in trust until the child attains legal age.
- Non-biological custodial caregivers receiving distribution shares for minors prior to November 30, 2024 will continue to receive payments until the minor child(ren) turns 18.
- If requested, proper documentation must be provided.

In the event of Postal Strike:

- Cheques will be available for in-person pickup or direct deposit.
- Direct deposit is now available for Canadian **and US** bank accounts.

Canadian members

- If you received direct deposit last year and your account information ***has*** changed, you must notify Finance.

US members

- Please contact Finance for direct deposit options.
- You must provide banking information ***each year***, even if it hasn't changed.

About Post Majority

Post-majority support services aim to prioritize the needs of First Nations youth aging out of care by offering flexible, culturally appropriate, and youth-centered support. These services focus on accessibility, timeliness, and reducing administrative burden, while being guided by principles of reconciliation and substantive equality. The goal is to provide holistic, wrap-around support to promote well-being and positive outcomes, including help with housing, food, employment, mental health, and healthy relationships.

Eligibility includes youth and young adults (generally under age 26 or as defined by local legislation) who were in care—either under the FNCFS Program or provincially funded care—while ordinarily resident on reserve. Care status includes various placements such as guardianship, kinship, and alternate care, and is defined by living outside the home of origin with FNCFS or provincial funding.

Post Majority Care

Who is eligible for post majority services? Post-majority supports and services funded through the FNCFS Program are accessible to those who are (captured under one of the following categories):

- A youth who is in alternate care approaching the age of majority;
- A young adult who was in care, as of the day they turned the age of majority and have not yet reached the age of 26;
- A youth in jurisdictions where voluntary provisions enable a youth to leave care prior to the age of majority.

Focus of support for Post Majority

- Access to Financial Support
- Access to Learning and Educational Opportunities
- Access to Safe, Stable, and Comfortable Housing
- Support for Physical, Mental, and Social Well-being

Purpose of the Position

The Economic Development Coordinator is responsible for implementing, monitoring, and improving the Economic Development program while ensuring the delivery of a high-quality program in alignment with relevant regulations and the policies and procedures established by the First Nation Council. The Economic Development Coordinator provides leadership and direction to all Economic Development program staff. The coordinator is focused on improving the First Nation's overall capacity for sustainable economic growth and diversification in collaboration with the Aamjiwnaang community and potential partners.

Responsibilities

Economic Development Program Development, Planning, and Implementation:

- Plan for and implement high-quality programs and services in alignment with the economic development program goals, plans, and funding/grant requirements
- Monitor implementation of program plans and overall program performance
- Oversee and manage multiple projects in alignment with project plans and all relevant requirements
- Remain informed of Provincial and Federal economic development services, initiatives, and funding/grant opportunities and communicate this information to the department manager
- Keep abreast of new and innovative programming opportunities and initiatives and make recommendations for improvement while ensuring ongoing compliance with relevant economic development regulations and funding/grant requirements
- Support the development of new programs and proposals to meet identified community needs
- In partnership with the Manager of Development, liaise with professional consultants, industry partners, relevant agencies, boards, advisory committees, and local and provincial government as appropriate
- In partnership with the Manager of Development and appropriate staff and committee members, prepare 2-year strategic plan for Economic Development
- Promote a positive image of Economic Development programs to the public, encouraging community consultation and participation

People Management:

- Provide leadership and direction to economic development program staff
- Supervise and support direct reports to ensure and foster wellbeing in a cooperative working environment in accordance with policies, procedures, and systems in place
- Ensure staff conduct themselves in a professional manner in dealing with Aamjiwnaang Band members, staff, and the public
- Oversee hiring, onboarding, training, and instruct team members on programs and services.
- Provide guidance, coaching, support, and training and development opportunities while engaging direct reports in goal setting and performance evaluation

Position Title: Shelter Support Workers (*Emergency Winter Shelter*)

Location: Sarnia, ON

Duration: Contract – 12 Weeks (full-time, part-time, call-in, 8:30pm to 8:30am) including weekends and holidays

Posting Closes/Deadline: Open

Position Summary:

Shelter Support Staff provide support to shelter residents during the evening, overnight, and weekend hours. A general summary of responsibilities includes providing a safe, clean environment, supporting, and assisting guests residing in shelter, and documenting any safety/security concerns or rule violations.

Responsibilities:

- Provide support and crisis intervention through harm reduction approaches, culturally safe and trauma-informed care.
- Ability to provide resource information for individuals and families we serve.
- Communicate necessary information to outreach staff to keep them informed.
- Follow and enforce guidelines, and policies with shelter guests.
- Support and assist guests with their shelter needs as they arise (ex. questions, concerns, hygiene supplies, cleaning supplies, bedding, food and more).
- Ensure the privacy and safety of other guests by not confirming the identity of other guests, and by not allowing anyone other than guests, staff, case workers or law enforcement on the premises.
- Maintain the cleanliness of shelter through performing light housekeeping tasks.
- Complete proper documentation; intake, health check (eg. Needs a mask, wounds, etc.), logs, shift notes, referrals, etc.

INHERENT JURISDICTION



What would Aamjiwnaang's own law look like?

Aamjiwnaang's law would embody our values and traditions concerning child and family wellbeing, aiming to reclaim how we raise our children and support families in healing from past harms. A ratified law by the community would carry the weight of federal law, preventing Ontario and Canada from making decisions about Aamjiwnaang children without our consent.

Is there funding for this initiative? Yes, the Federal government offers capacity-building funding for communities asserting their inherent jurisdiction. This funding typically covers all related expenses for five years without requiring the use of local revenue.

What is inherent jurisdiction, and how does it apply to Aamjiwnaang?

Aamjiwnaang First Nation has always maintained its right and authority to care for and make decisions about our children. Despite colonial interference and child welfare systems, we continue to uphold this right. Indigenous communities across Canada have successfully exercised their jurisdiction over their children and families, independent of federal and provincial laws. We are reasserting Aamjiwnaang's inherent jurisdiction because colonial child welfare systems have caused significant harm by separating children from their families and culture. In 2020, the federal government enacted a law recognizing Indigenous communities' inherent jurisdiction over child and family wellbeing. This allows Aamjiwnaang to create our own family wellbeing agency and governing law, with capacity funding provided by the federal government for this purpose.

INHERENT JURISDICTION

Aamjiwnaang will explore the community's interest in reasserting its jurisdiction over children and families. Input from children, youth, parents, and Elders is vital for developing a mandate to pursue this jurisdiction and create our own laws.

The voices of our children, youth, parents, aunts, uncles, grandparents, and Elders are critical in the process of developing a mandate to pursue inherent jurisdiction and, subsequently, in creating our own law and supporting its implementation.



The Anishinabek Nation Governance Agreement is a historic step towards self-determination, recognizing the inherent right of the First Nations to govern themselves in accordance with their traditional, values, and law in four key areas: Elections, Citizenship, Language and Culture, and Operations and Management.

Purpose of the Agreement

The purpose of the Anishinabek Nation Governance Agreement (ANGA) is to formally recognize the inherent right to self-governance for Anishinabek First Nations to enable them to exercise law-making powers in four key areas of governance without relying on the Indian Act.



Recognition of Self-Government

Canada acknowledges the authority of First Nations to govern themselves in the specific areas of Leadership, Citizenship, Language and Culture, and Management and Operations.



Protection of Aboriginal & Treaty Rights

The agreement does not change or limit any existing Aboriginal or treaty rights.

Pediatric Occupational Therapy is a healthcare service that helps children develop the skills they need to participate in daily activities, or "occupations," such as playing, learning, and self-care.

Motor coordination – is the ability to use different parts of the body together smoothly and efficiently to do an activity. It involves the brain, muscles, and joints all working as a team to control movement—like catching a ball, riding a bike, or using scissors.



Infant Motor Skills– the abilities an infant develops to control their large and small muscle groups to perform everyday movements and tasks.

Fine motor skills – improving hand and finger movements, like holding a pencil or doing up buttons

Learning strategies – helping children stay focused, follow instructions, and succeed at school

Sensory processing – helping children handle things like loud sounds, textures, or movement in a way that feels more comfortable.

Feeding and swallowing – creating an optimal eating environment, improve oral motor function, develop fine motor skills for utensils, and manage challenging behaviors, thereby increasing a child's ability to feed and swallow safely and independently.

Self-care skills – learning to dress, brush teeth, use the toilet, and more

Visual Perception – helping kids make sense of visual information (like puzzles, shapes, and letters)

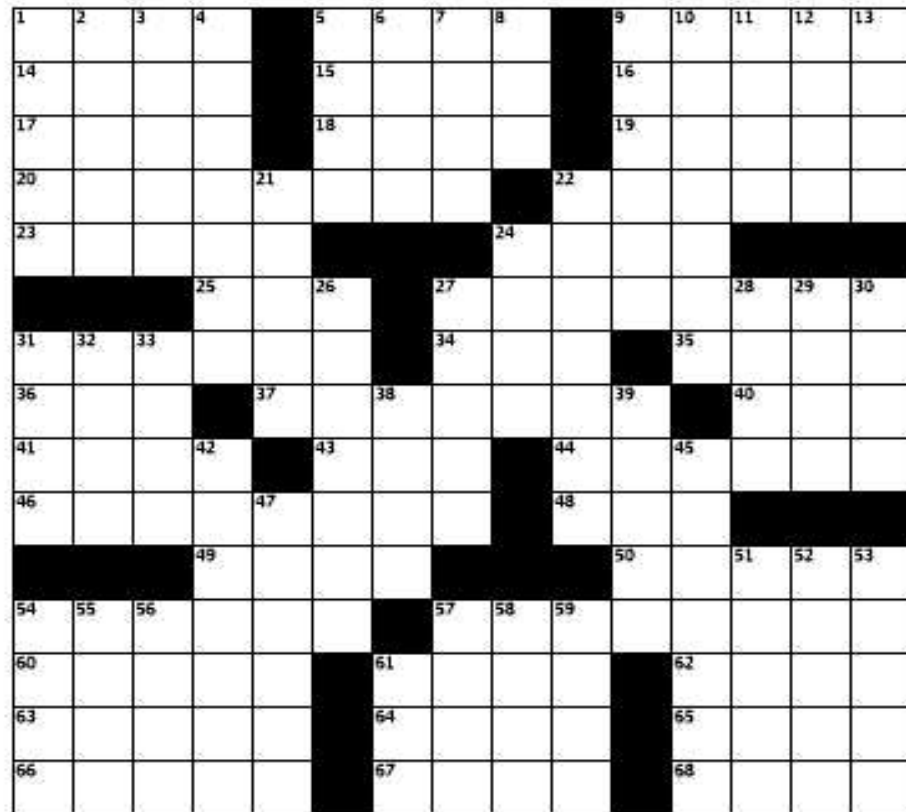
