Position Summary

To provide case management through the development of a care plan as a result of comprehensive client assessment. To assist with the implementation of the Home and Community Care (HCC) Program Service Delivery Plan. To assist with the daily operations of the Home and Community Care Program to meet the program goals and objectives while reflecting the Aamjiwnaang First Nations philosophy, policies, and regulations. To uphold the College of Nurses of Ontario regulations, standards of practice and best practice guidelines.

Responsibilities

- Respect and protect the rights of clients, including but not limited to their right to independence, autonomy, and self-determination; their right to choose and practice individual beliefs, values, religion, and culture; their right to privacy and dignity; and their right to live free from retaliation, discrimination, and abuse.
- Maintain and model appropriate personal boundaries with clients and refrain from involvement with client personal affairs or other business that may constitute a conflict of interest.
- Support clients with problem solving, compatibility, and conflict resolution.
- Participate in regular plan of care meetings with other members of the Home and Community Care Program, and the Health Care Team. Facilitate client/family meetings when necessary.
- Provide comprehensive assessment of a client to identify needs and develop a care plan for the client.
- Evaluate and update all nursing care plans on active files as per HCC policy.
- Provide initial and follow-up homemaking needs assessments as required.
- Provide direct nursing care and health education to individuals/families as necessary.
- Ensure referrals and follow-up with appropriate service providers.
- Implement collaboration with physicians for diagnosis, treatment, and care planning.
- Organize and prepare client health records for clinical assessments.
- Maintain confidential, comprehensive, and up to date documentation of assessments, provision of professional nursing service, referrals, and follow-up.
- Maintain statistical documentation of all activities.
- Advise HCC Supervisor immediately of any change in client condition.
- Provide direction to the home support workers (HSWs) and personal support workers (PSWs) regarding client service delivery needs as required.
- Assist with the education activities for the HSW/PSWs and families of clients.
- Perform visits of the HSW/PSWs to assess clinical skills.
- Perform visits to assess client satisfaction with the HCC program.
- Collaborate with the HCC Supervisor to jointly complete the HSW/PSWs performance evaluations, with your input related to clinical issues.
- Maintain continuity of the HCC program in the absence of the HCC Program Supervisor.

Position Summary

The Anishinaabemowin Language Educator will provide Ojibwe language at the Aamjiwnaang Kinomaage Gamig school. Make cultural connections and strengthen student learning to traditions, story, song and land-based learning. The Anishinaabemowin Language Educator works in collaboration with classroom teachers to plan, facilitate and deliver language that supports the overall language revitalization strategy within our community.

Responsibilities

1. Develop lesson plans, assessments, evaluations and provide Language Instruction for all grades assigned
2. Create and provide long-range plans to guide the instruction delivery
3. Inspire and mentor students to develop pride in their ancestral language and motivate them to use language through speaking anishinaabemowin, art, music and other experiences within their daily lives
4. Collaborate with other Language Instructors and Teachers in the development of Anishinaabemowin language, resources and curriculum to inform classrooms of language learning outside of language classroom specific
5. Lead and promote land-based experiences
6. Provide effective classroom management
7. Develop and maintain language progress reports and term report cards on students

9. Attend workshops, training sessions, and conferences as it pertains to the program.

CULTURAL FUND

Funding will be provided on a one-time basis to support traditional healing practices through, education, participation, and resource acquisition. Up to **\$350** per family/household (on and off reserve)

Eligible Expenses:

- Regalia costs (ie., belts, beadwork, fabric, sinew)
- Ceremony costs (ie, ceremony foods, fabric, wood, medicines)
- Culture honorarium for teachings and ceremonies
- Registration fees for traditional language gatherings or classes
- Covering travel to ceremonies, culture gatherings, or knowledge gatherings
- Purchasing traditional medicines (tobacco, sage, sweet grass, cedar)
- Purchasing cultural based literature and resources

Ineligible Expenses:

- Medical Supplies (ie. essential oils, pain pray, teas, and vitamins)
- Meals during travel
- Coolers, canopy, air mattresses, camping chairs
- Harvesting items (ie. boots, coats, fishing supplies, hunting supplies)
- Clothing and fashion jewelry

Staffing Updates

Welcome Back & Thank-you

On behalf of our team, we are pleased to share that our colleague has returned from maternity leave as of late March. We want to extend our heartfelt gratitude to Arlene King for her wonderful, dedicated coverage and support of our program during this absence. Please join us in congratulating Arlene as she steps into her new role as the Indigenous Patient Navigator at Windsor Regional Hospital, where she will continue to provide incredible care and advocacy for patients and families in our community.

Changes to ColonCancerCheck CCC

Starting July 1, Ontario is lowering the eligibility age for publicly funded colorectal cancer screenings from 50 to 45 for average-risk individuals, and to 40 for those at increased risk. Eligible Ontarians aged 45–49 will automatically receive a ColonCancerCheck letter, while those without a primary care provider can secure their test by calling Health811 at 866-797-0007. This historic expansion gives more than one million additional people access to life-saving, early detection services.

Colorectal Cancer Screening Program

Ontario Cervical Screening Program

HPV Screening Guidelines

The Ontario Cervical Screening Program has updated its approach, largely transitioning from the traditional Pap smear to more accurate HPV testing. Routine screening is now recommended every five years for anyone with a cervix aged 25 to 69 who has ever been sexually active. Appointments can be booked directly through your family doctor, nurse practitioner, or local community health clinic. If an HPV test comes back positive, it is critical to connect with your provider to arrange a follow-up colposcopy as soon as possible to ensure any pre-cancerous changes are quickly evaluated and managed.

Ontario Lung Screening Program

»»» A message from Dr. Chintan Shah, MD, CCFP,
Regional Indigenous Cancer Lead

Lung cancer remains the leading cause of cancer death in Ontario, disproportionately impacting First Nations communities due to systemic health disparities and higher smoking rates. Because symptoms rarely appear until advanced stages, early detection through the Ontario Lung Screening Program (OLSP) in Windsor-Essex is vital for improving survival outcomes.

Eligible individuals aged 55 to 80 with a history of smoking cigarettes daily for at least 20 years can access a low-dose CT scan by getting a healthcare referral or calling the OLSP directly at 519-255-8670. Talk to your provider to assess your risk—including environmental exposures like asbestos or benzene—and see if this early detection program is right for you.

Louise Moss - Indigenous Patient Navigator

Louise Moss is a proud member of Caldwell First Nation, a mother of three, and a respected community advocate living and working within the Three Fires Confederacy territory. Louise's work is deeply informed by both her professional experience and personal connection to cancer within her family and across her region. Like many Indigenous communities, she has witnessed the disproportionate burden of cancer, including delayed diagnoses, barriers to care, and the lasting impacts of loss and grief. These realities continue to shape her commitment to advancing equitable, culturally safe systems of care and strengthening trust between Indigenous communities and healthcare institutions.

With a background spanning healthcare, safety, education, and full-spectrum doula care—including end-of-life support—Louise brings a holistic, trauma-informed, and culturally grounded approach to her role. She supports patients and families from diagnosis through treatment, survivorship, and transition, ensuring they feel seen, heard, and never alone. Her work centers advocacy, system navigation, and the integration of culturally meaningful supports that honour each individual's identity, history, and needs.

The Erie St. Clair Regional Cancer Program successfully hosted the 2026 Indigenous Cancer Conference on May 1st in Leamington, in collaboration with Caldwell First Nation. This pivotal event brought together healthcare professionals, community leaders, and advocates to discuss culturally appropriate care, improve healthcare pathways, and address regional cancer disparities. It served as a powerful platform for sharing knowledge and strengthening relationships to foster better health and wellness outcomes for Indigenous families across the region. Concluding the event on a powerful note, Dr. Hamm, a medical oncologist at Windsor Regional Hospital, gifted an arrowhead she found in her youth in Kingsville to the Caldwell First Nation community—the "people of the flint arrows"—symbolizing the event's deep commitment to community partnership and shared knowledge.

The booklet also provides details about what you need to do if shelter-in-place or evacuation order is issued. Any such order will be issued using the **Aamjiwnaang Notification System**. How the Community booklet came about:

It was recognized by the Aamjiwnaang Emergency Control Group and Chief & Council that community members need information for shelter-in-place and evacuation procedures as noted in the Emergency Response Plan.

****NOTE****

Please keep your booklet in a safe place that is accessible in an emergency, so that you may reference it if a Shelter in Place or Evacuation has been issued. It is recommended that the information contained in the booklet be reviewed by everyone in your household.

The safety and well-being of community members during an emergency is everyone's responsibility.

Notice: Catch Basin Larviciding



Annual catch basin larviciding will begin soon. These treatments are done to help control the mosquito population to reduce the incidence of West Nile Virus.

Pestalto Environmental Health Services Inc. will conduct larval surveillance and apply larvicide in catch basins.

Residents can also help reduce the mosquito population by:

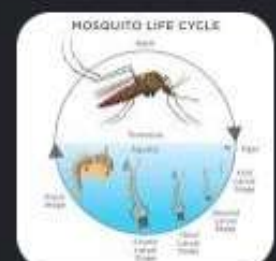

TOP 10 TICK HIDING SPOTS ON YOUR BODY

Tick checks are one of the ways you can prevent Lyme disease and other infections spread by ticks. Check your entire body, especially:

WHAT TO LOOK FOR?

Feel for bumps and look for tiny dark spots. Look carefully, most ticks are very small!

Found a tick? Remove it immediately to reduce the risk of infection.

ENJOY THE OUTDOORS, WITHOUT A TICK

Lyme disease is spread by the bite of infected blacklegged ticks. These ticks are often found in and near areas with trees, shrubs, tall grass or piles of leaves.

Follow these tips when heading outside:

01 PREVENT

- Wear light coloured long-sleeved shirts and pants.
- Tuck your shirt into your pants, and your pants into your socks.
- Wear closed-toe shoes.
- Use bug spray with DEET or Icaridin (always follow label directions).
- Walk on cleared paths or walkways.
- You can also wear permethrin-treated clothing, now available in Canada (always follow label directions).

02 CHECK

- Shower or bathe as soon as possible after being outdoors.
- Do a daily full-body tick check on yourself, your children, your pets and your gear.
- Put your clothes in a dryer on high heat for at least 10 minutes.

03 TAKE ACTION

- Use clean fine-point tweezers to immediately remove attached ticks by slowly pulling them straight out. Try not to twist or squeeze the tick.
- Wash the bite area with soap and water or alcohol-based sanitizer.
- Wrap the tick in a closed container and bring it with you if you go see your health care provider.
- Contact your health care provider if you're not feeling well or if you are concerned after being bitten by a tick.

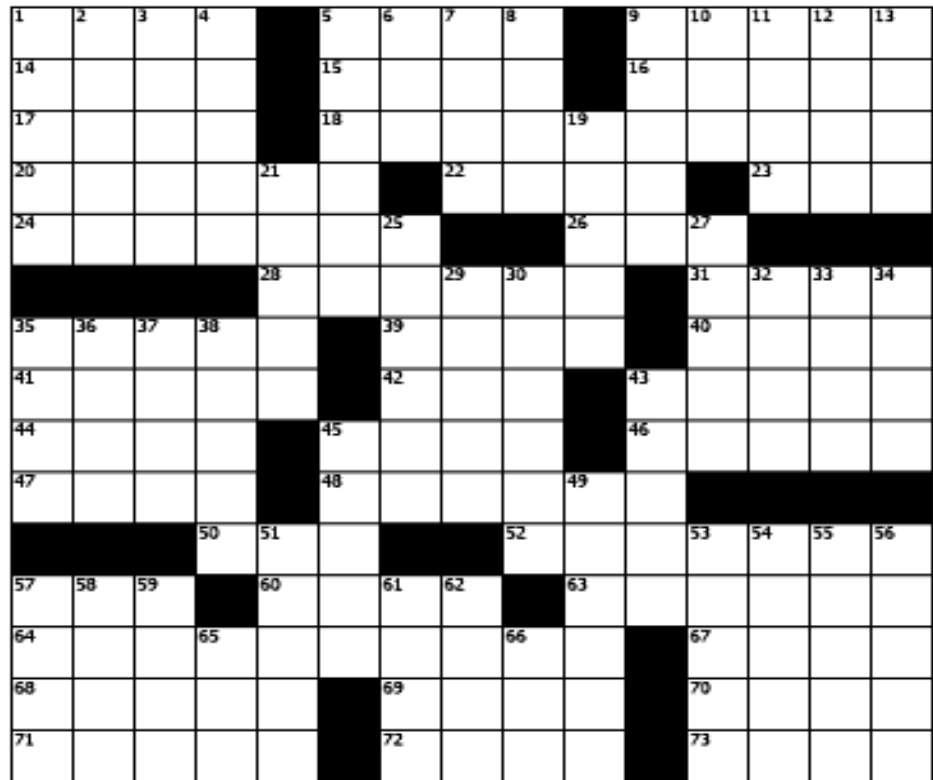

Youth, Adult & Seniors Recreation Funds

Chief and Council along with the Community Services Committee have developed a new Funding Policy to help our youth with their Sports, Arts and Recreational activities.

Youth up to the age of 25 years can fill out an application with the maximum funding being **\$800/CA per fiscal year**.

Seniors who have reached the age of 60 years (and above) can fill out an application with the maximum funding being **\$800/CA per fiscal year**.

Adults between the age of 26 and 59 years can fill out an application with the maximum funding being **\$300/CA per fiscal year**.

These maximums will take into consideration LNHL reimbursement and any other recreational funding

This is a reimbursement program so receipts must be submitted with your applications. Deadline to submit applications is Thursday @ noon
